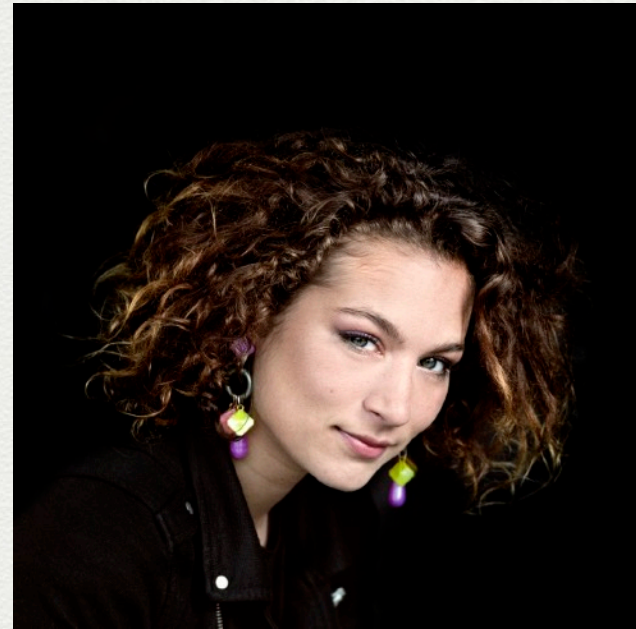

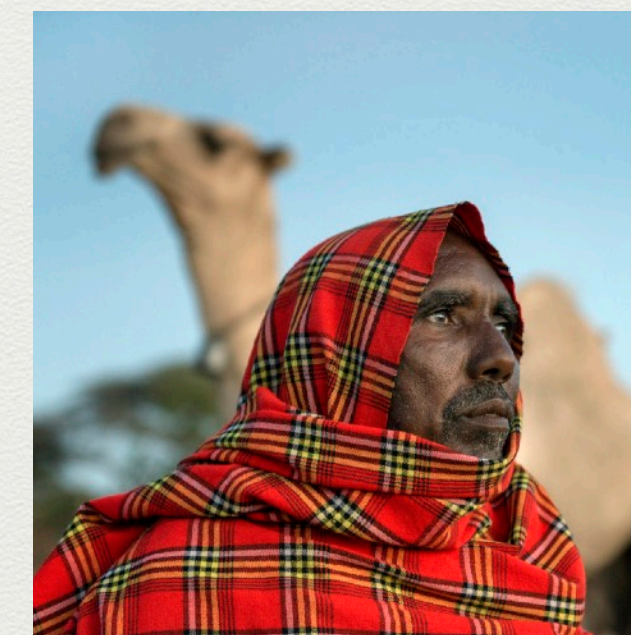
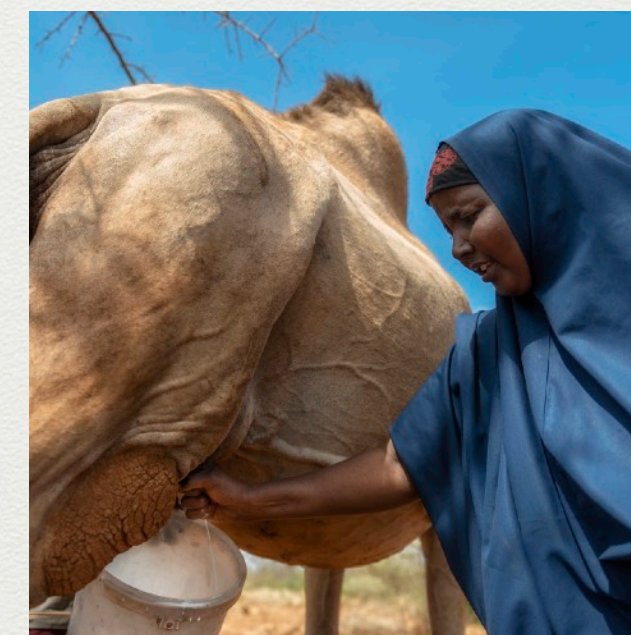
TENS OF THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE AFFECTED

Flooding in Kenya has caused numerous deaths and displaced tens of thousands of people. 'Our government needs to implement long-term solutions,' experts say.



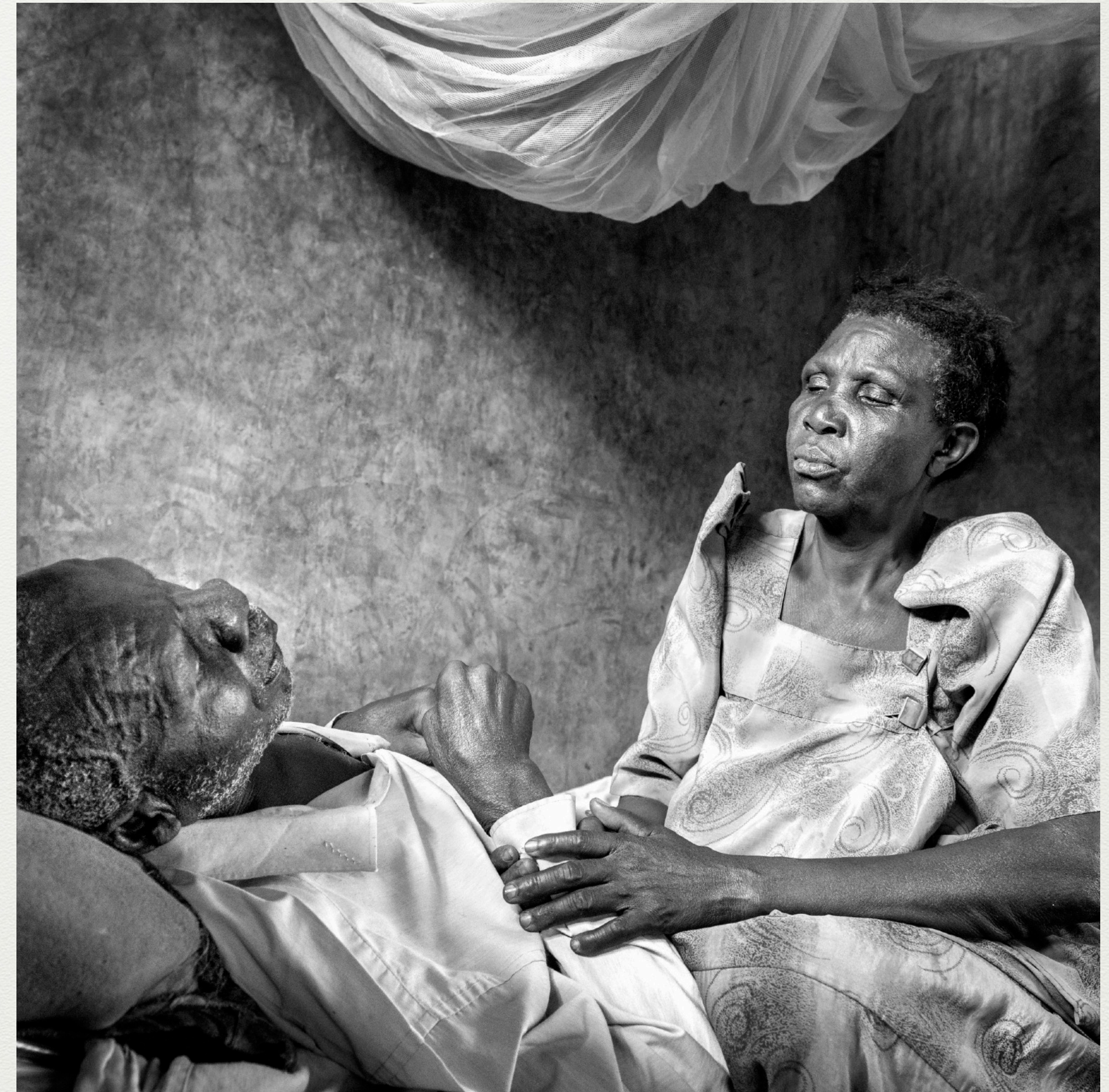
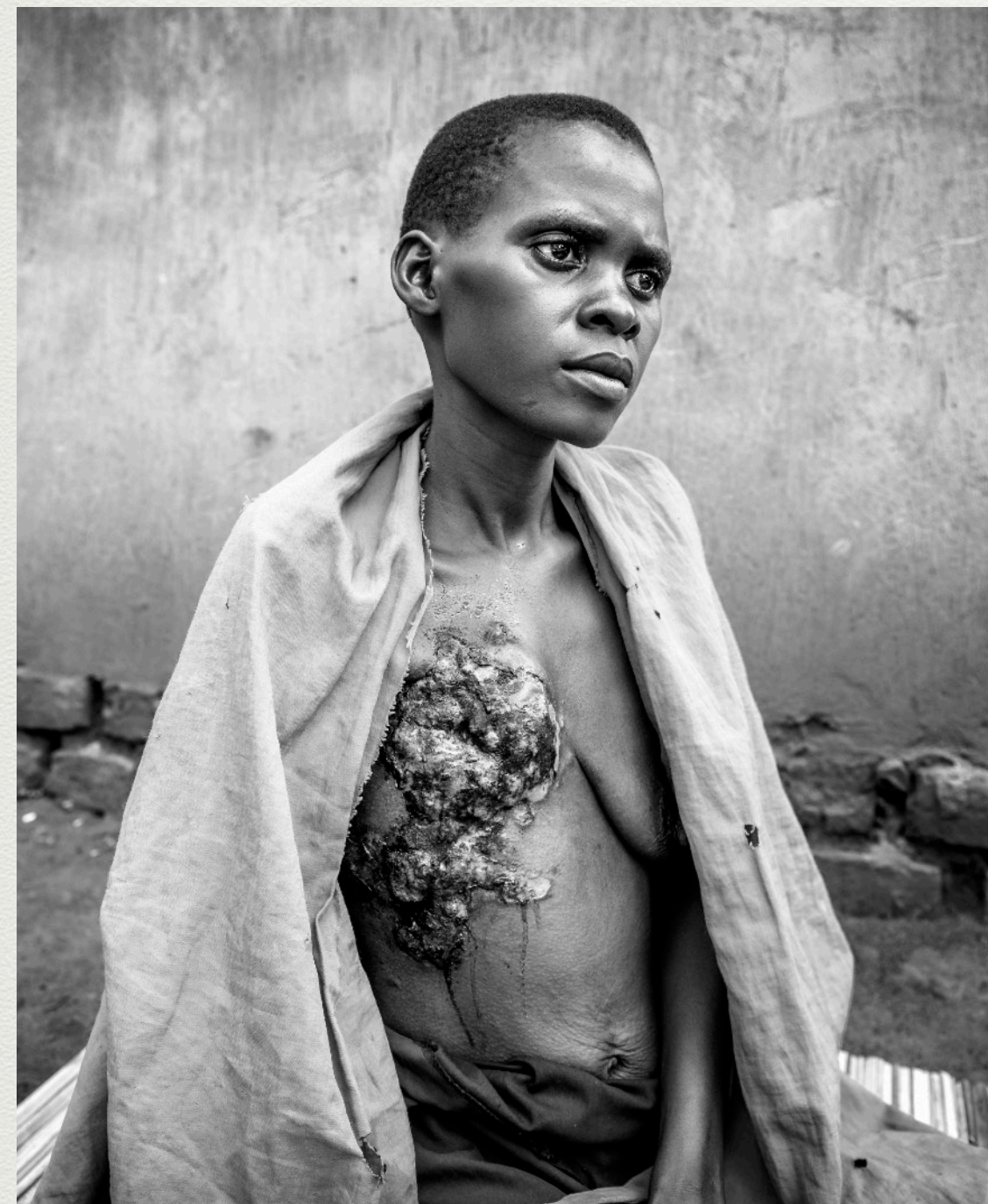
IN KENYA, CAMELS ARE THE NEW CASH COW

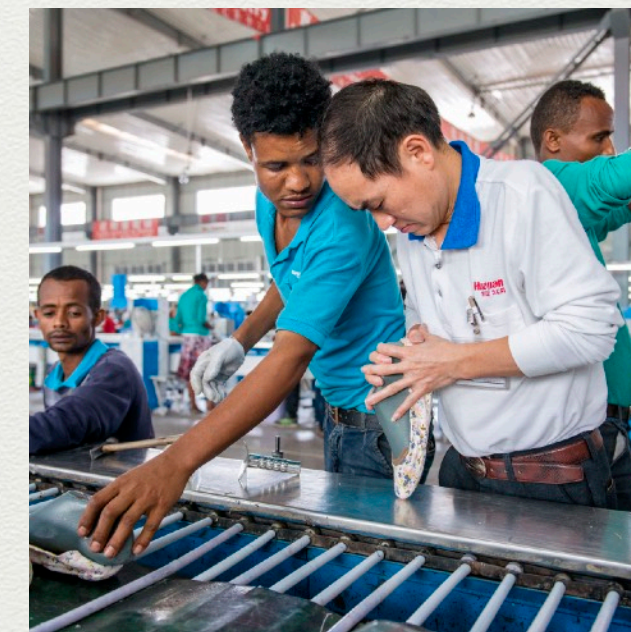
THE RISE OF CANCER

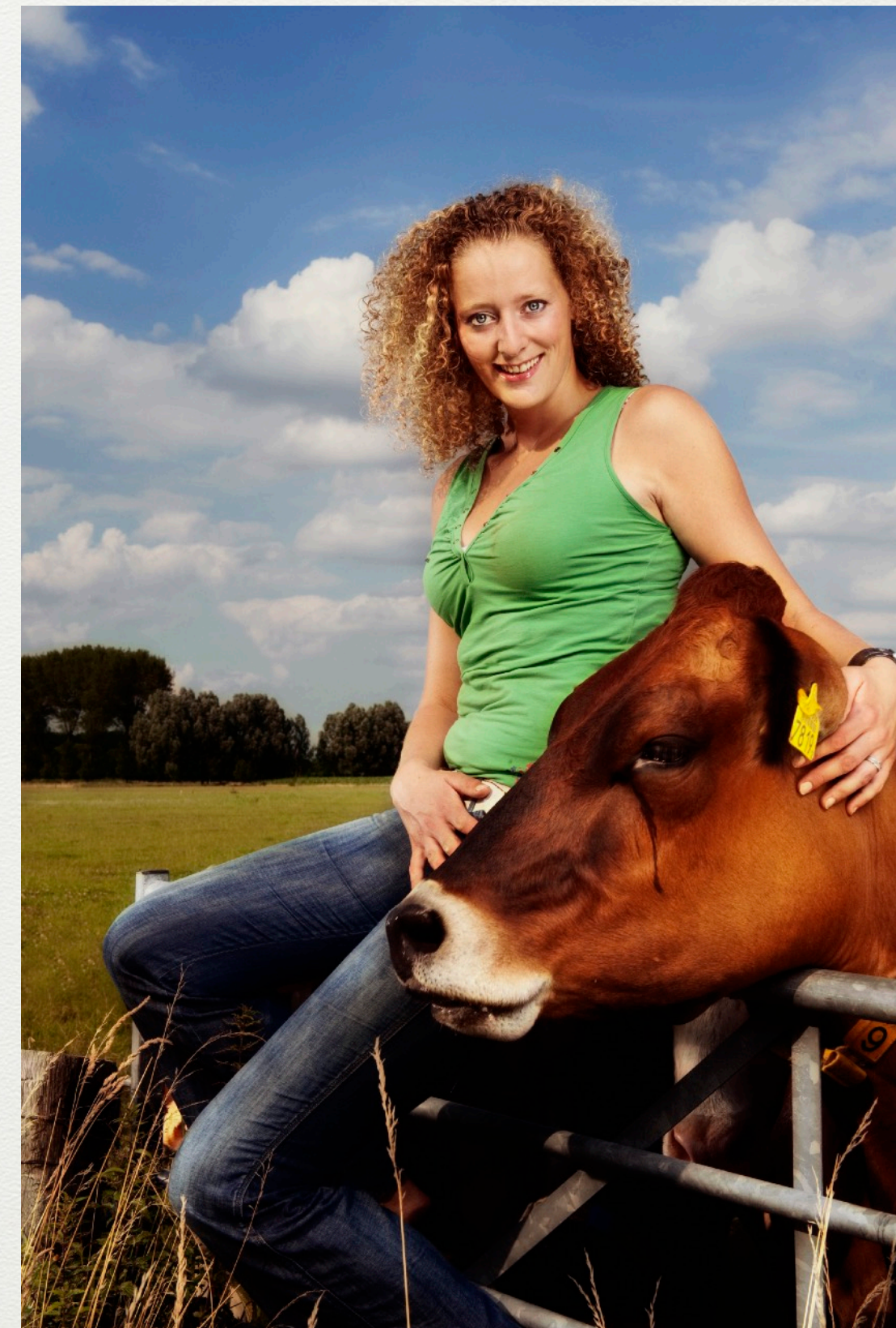
Breaking Barriers in Afghanistan's Police

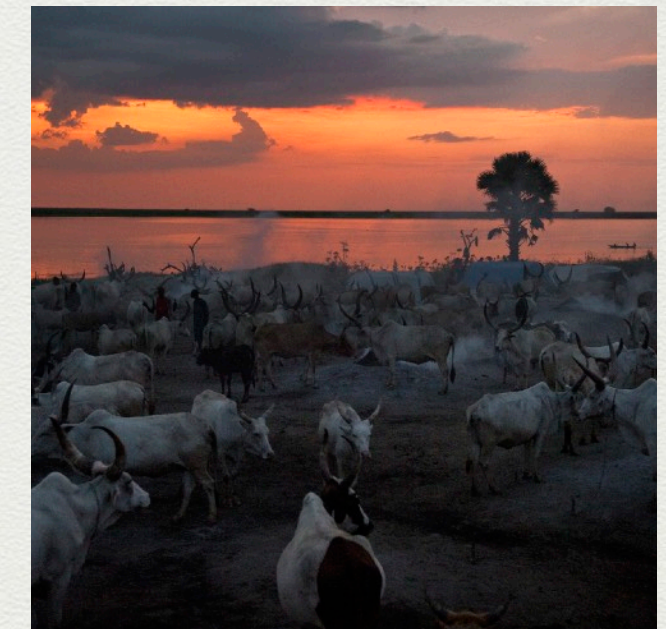
WITHOUT THE CUT

Although female genital mutilation (FGM) has been outlawed in Kenya since 2001, a majority of girls of semi-nomadic tribes like the Maasai and Samburu still undergo this painful and damaging ritual. Eleven years ago, the NGO Amref Health Africa started training all age groups in Maasai and Samburu communities on the consequences of FGM and, in collaboration with the communities, developed an Alternative Rite of Passage (ARP). Now, already more than 13.300 Maasai and Samburu girls graduated from childhood to womanhood without being circumcised.



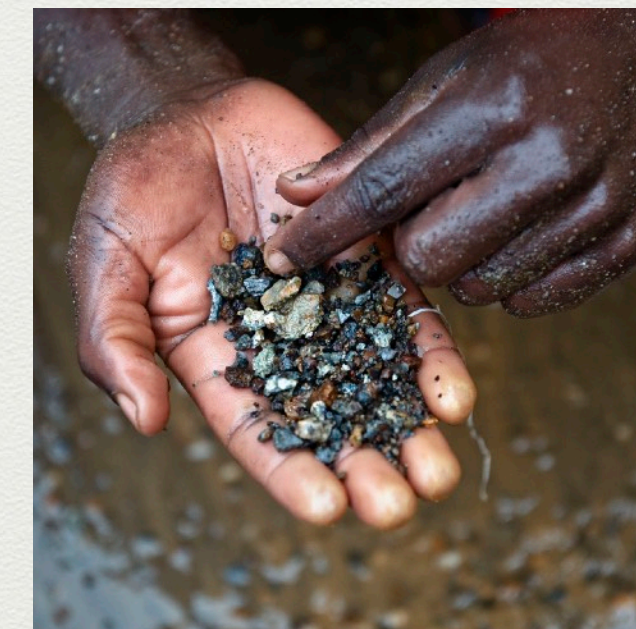
CATTLECAMPS IN SOUTH SUDAN

Livestock is critically important within South Sudanese society. The sector is an important source of income and food, cattle ownership bestows social status and prestige, cattle are used for payment of dowries, to pay compensation, to settle disputes, and -in the absence of an established banking sector- serve as a reliable way to secure assets.



CONGOLESE 'CONFLICT-FREE' TIN

By setting up a 'tag a bag' Due Diligence system, a consortium of international companies tried to take the conflict out of the minerals to revive legal mining in eastern Congo after a crackdown on conflict minerals. During a visit at this first 'conflict-free' tin mine in South Kivu in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) we still saw numerous challenges.
